## "DID YOU TELL HIM GOODBYE?"

That was the rhetorical question my colleague asked me. I had been speaking of a man I picked up who was begging on the streets and had asked me to drop him off at a homeless shelter. He got into the car and told me of his recent hospital discharge for pneumonia.



It was a short ride. The aroma and the other parts of the story made it seem long.

At the shelter, a crowd stood waiting for the doors to open. It was cloudy and cold. Tattered layers of clothing would offer extra comfort in the crowded sleeping areas. Personal hygiene was a problem. Clustered, people shared body heat and viral and bacterial infections by coughing.

Did I tell him goodbye?

I had left him in a place where he might suffer a more serious illness than the one for which he had been treated.

Miriam Medical Clinics is vital for serving the poor. We cannot diminish pandemic, but we can address illnesses that weaken the immune systems.
